Gender differences in opinion around gender inequality in Canada

Introduction

March 8 is International Women's Day. It's a global day to recognize and celebrate women's and girls' social, economic, cultural, and political achievements. The Government of Canada's theme for International Women's Day (IWD) 2023 is Every Woman Counts.

It's a reminder that all women, from all ages and walks of life, have a place in every aspect of Canadian society, including in the economic, social and democratic spheres.

As the federal government points out "It's also a time to raise awareness of the progress made towards achieving gender equality and the work remaining to be done."

But a significant minority of Canadians feel that the issue of gender inequality is being blown way out of proportion according to a national survey conducted by Leger Marketing for the Association for Canadian Studies and the University of Manitoba. Some one in four Canadians hold that view with nearly one in three men feeling the issue is being blown way out of proportion while some one in six women share that view. There are important differences in the extent to which importance is assigned to gender inequality notably on the basis of age, income and party preference.

The findings arise from a survey of 3031 Canadians and 4700 Americans done via web panel over the month of October 2022 conducted by the firm Leger for the Association for Canadian Studies and the University of Manitoba. While no margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (Web panel in this case) for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 3031 respondents would have a margin of error of ±1.9%, 19 times out of 20




Canadian Men far more likely than women to believe that the issue of gender equality is being blown out of proportion; women much more likely to believe the response has been insufficient




The perceived gap in gender inequality is greater for those under 35 as women take the issue a fair bit more seriously than do men


