Value of a University Degree: What do you think and what your parents told you

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Introduction and Methodology

The Leger survey was conducted during the week of September 25th, 2023 for the Association for Canadian Studies and the Metropolis Institute via web panel with 1502 Canadians. A margin of error cannot be associated with a non-probability sample in a panel survey for comparison purposes. A probability sample of 1502 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.5%, 19 times out of 20



Only one in four Canadians believe it is necessary to have a university degree to succeed economically; Canadians under 25 are divided over the question
