Canada's Demographic Revolution and What it Means for our Identities

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Canada: One of the Top 20 Fastest Growing Countries in the World

According to Statistics Canada, Canada continued to lead G7 countries for population growth and was likely among the top 20 fastest growing countries in the world. The population growth on July 1, 2023, marks the highest population growth rate recorded for a 12-month period since 1957 (+3.3%), during the Hungarian refugee crisis and at the height of the baby boom. In absolute numbers, the increase observed last year is more than twice the increase observed in 1957 (+555,000).

Statistics Canada demonstrates that if the rate of population growth seen this past year remained constant in the future, it would lead to the Canadian population doubling in 25 years.



Statscan Current and Future Projection of the Canadian Population

CURRENT: CANADA HITS 40 MILLION (JULY 2023)

This is a historic milestone for the country, and it occurs after a record-setting year of growth. In 2022, Canada's population grew by an unprecedented 1.1 million people, most of them permanent and temporary immigrants. Thanks to this influx, the 40-million mark was reached even faster than expected.

FUTURE PROJECTION

According to the <u>reference scenario</u> issued by Statistics Canada, the Canadian population would reach 47.7 million in 2041, and 25.0 million of them would be immigrants or children of immigrants born in Canada, accounting for 52.4% of the total population. In 2016, this population was 14.4 million and accounted for 40.0% of the total Canadian population.



Analysis of Future Projection of the Canadian Population

Based on a projected population estimate for 2026, Canada will more likely reach Statscan's 2041 reference scenario by the year 2031.

In 2021, Toronto emerged as North America's largest immigrant receiving metropolitan area which only dropped back to 2nd place behind the US in 2022 – despite the latter being 9x the population size of Canada. The US takes 2.5x immigrants annually, by comparison.

Visible Minority/Racialized in Canada vs. Metro Toronto

One in three Canadians under 15 identify as vismin/racialized, while in Metro Toronto it's closer to 2 in 3.

With the Current Rate of Population Growth Continuing...

If the rate of population growth seen this past year remained constant in the future, it would lead to the Canadian population doubling in 25 years, and nearly half of Canadians might be visible minority/racialized.

In the 2021 Census, three groups represented 16.1% of Canada's total population: South Asians (2.6 million people; 7.1%), Chinese (1.7 million; 4.7%) and Black people (1.5 million; 4.3%), with each population topping 1 million. In the 2016 Census, these groups represented 13.6% of Canada's total population.

According to Statscan's <u>most recent population projections</u>, in 2041, the South Asian group could top 5 million people, the Chinese and Black populations could each exceed 3 million, and the Filipino population could go over 2 million.



Christian Identifiers Verging on Minority Status, if not Already the Case

In the 2021 Census, over 19.3 million people reported a Christian religion, representing just over half of the Canadian population (53.3%). However, this proportion is down from 67.3% in 2011 and 77.1% in 2001.

Approximately 12.6 million people, or more than one-third of Canada's population, reported having no religious affiliation. The proportion of this population has more than doubled in 20 years, going from 16.5% in 2001 to 34.6% in 2021 (Census Data).
