What makes Quebecers Learn the Other Official Language? Assessing the Quantity and Quality of Quebecers Bilingualism

Introduction: Is Bilingualism the Threat to French?

The year 2023 was marked by the introduction of various measures to diminish access to services in the English language by the Quebec government and increasingly promote the notion that French is more than ever under siege from English, especially in Montreal. Underlying government discourse over the threat of English is the preoccupation about bilingualism. Quebec thought leaders seem reticent to explicitly criticize, bilingualism which surveys reveal that Quebecers generally value. Hence the threat to the French language is often directed at first language English-speakers and predominantly English language institutions. Yet on the ground in Montreal, the interaction in the two languages between Montreal Francophones, Anglophones and Allophones is a reality of daily life as evidenced from a survey commissioned by the Association for Canadian Studies and conducted by the firm Léger Marketing. The survey reveals that it is those Francophones, Anglophones and Allophones that are most frequently in contact with each other that end up having the high rates of bilingualism that Quebecers value.

The survey was conducted during the week of September 18, 2023. The ACS-Leger survey was done via web panel with 1,000 Quebecers). A margin of error cannot be associated with a non-probability sample in a panel survey for comparison purposes. A probability sample of 1,000 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.5%, 19 times out of 20.



The Majority of Montrealers are Bilingual

Francophone Interaction with English-speaking Quebecers

Some 45% of Francophone Quebecers say they interact sometimes or often with English-speaking Quebecers.

English-speaking & French-speaking Quebec Interaction

In the Montreal Metropolitan Region, a majority of English Quebecers report often having contact with French-speaking Quebecers and over one in four French Quebecers often have contact with English-speaking Quebecers – a majority report often or sometimes having such contact.

Francophone Interaction with English-speaking Quebecers

Over one in four Montreal Francophones often interact with English-speaking Quebecers while the majority have contact often or sometimes.

Confidence in English & French among Bilinguals

Amongst bilinguals, Montreal Francophones think their ability to speak English is slightly better than Anglophones ability to speak French.
