# Canadian opinion on domestic relations between communities, viewing hate expression in the media and trust of selected groups

### Introduction and Methodology

January 7<sup>th</sup> 2024 marked 100 days in the War between Israel and Hamas. The ongoing conflict has sparked rising tension in countries outside the region. In Canada there has been an important impact on relations between communities, evolving degrees of trust towards groups and we've seen shifting patterns in those communities that have become the targets of hate expression. To assess the situation, a Leger Marketing survey was conducted for the Association for Canadian Studies during the week of October 27-29, 2023. To track the changes ACS commissioned a second survey 100 days into the conflict-from January 6-8, 2024

The surveys were conducted via web panel with 1632 Canadians in the October 2023 survey and 1521 in the January 2024 survey.

A margin of error cannot be associated with a non-probability sample in a panel survey for comparison purposes. A probability sample of 1521/1632 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.5%, 19 times out of 20



#### Highlights 1

- -Persons over 55 were most likely to see an increase in the past few weeks of expressions of hate in the media

- -Those observing increases in hate expression on social media are more likely to be concerned about intergroup relations
- -Trust in selected groups in Canada has increased since October with Canadian Jews being the object of a high level of trust amongst the population
- -Youngest cohort of Canadians (18-24) surveyed trust Palestinians more than Israelis while those over 55 trust Israelis more than Palestinians
- -While trust towards Muslims and Jews has gone up across all age cohorts except one and that is the youngest cohort where we observe a drop in trust of Jews since October 2023
