The Majority of Canadians do not identify as settler colonists

Introduction: Are non-Indigenous Canadians all settler colonists?

Across much of the academy and for some policy-makers it has become increasingly common to hear the term settler or settler colonist used to describe the "the non-Indigenous peoples living in Canada". The term tends to be associated with persons identified as belonging to the European-descended sociopolitical majority (though a large share of Canadians are not European descendants).

For most Canadians, whether born here or elsewhere, the Indigenous-Settler Colonist binary/dichotomy doesn't appear to reflect the way in which Canadians define themselves. This conclusion is reflected in a survey conducted by Leger for the Association for Canadian Studies which reveals that some 47% of Canadians disagree when asked whether they were settler colonists in Canada while some 30% didn't know and 23% agreed. It's reasonably safe to conclude that the 30% that didn't respond simply don't understand the notion of settler colonialism. Ironically the only group that to a significant extent see themselves as 'settlers' are Canada's francophones who often learned about that they colonized parts of the province a term which in French they equate with settling it. But in this case the question formulation in French gave rise to an interpretation that served to reaffirm a view amongst francophones that they were Canada's first settlers.

The survey was conducted by the firm Leger Marketing for the Association for Canadian Studies over the period September 20-22, 2024 with a sample of 1612 Canadians. A margin of error cannot be associated with a non-probability sample in a panel survey for comparison purposes. A probability sample of 1612 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.5%, 19 times out of 20.
